# Classic understanding of corruption



Individual "bad apple", acting alone



Violating the rules—engaging in "one off" deviant behavior



For personal gain (generally financial)



# Endemic Corruption

# **Dimensions**

Multi-actor and organized—a "team effort"

"a set of actors often connected in a network and ordered according to implicit rules"

### Institutionalized

2 Not "one-off" but underpinned by explicit or implicit rules

#### A broader rationale

A collective social, political, economic purpose beyond individuals' self-interest





# 1. Corruption as driver/enabler of conflict

Corruption is a divider and worsens dividers

- Reinforcing marginalization
- Aggravating inter-group inequalities, exclusion, grievances
- Worsening stereotypes and 'othering' (moral 'evil')
- Undermining legitimacy and capacity of government institutions—reinforcing intragroup loyalties
- A tool for dominance and waging conflict

3. Corruption-blind peacebuilding can exacerbate corruption

4. Anti-corruption can inadvertently fuel conflict

Conflict Sensitivity: Gaining a sound understanding of the two-way interaction between aid activities and context and acting to minimize negative impacts and maximize positive impacts of the intervention on the conflict.

- Adapt AC approaches in contexts of conflict & endemic corruption—innovative, less adversarial
- Pay attention to impacts on conflict and politics



# **Peacebuilding**

- Address corruption in early post-violence stage
- Consider and mitigate corruption impacts of peacebuilding interventions
